A New Appearance

At the initiative of the Leadership Team, consisting since 2017 of Jan Göschel, Bart Vanmechelen and Sonia Zausch. the ‹Curative Education and Social Therapy Council, founded in 1987, set out in search of a new name and a new look that would do justice to the internationality, interdisciplinary breadth and diversity of forms and ways of working that have developed in this field of work. The new name (Anthroposophic Council for Inclusive Social Development> crystallized with the involvement of delegates and, through them, extended circles of colleagues all over the world. A Council is a body of dialogue, exchange and mutual consultation. (Inclusive Social Development> refers to the common objective of the various organizations under the umbrella of the Council: To facilitate the development of a society in which every person can find the

conditions for a successful life. This is done through a variety of participatory initiatives in the areas named in the claim: Education. Wellbeing and Community. The logo depicts the Council's activity as a rhythmic process of movement and breathing between periphery and center, through which the whole movement can evolve and pass through its metamorphoses. The new website (inclusivesocial.org). which was presented together with the name and logo at the meeting of the delegates in October 2018, will serve as a communication platform for all members of the network represented in the Council.

International Conference for Curative Education and Social Therapy

Social - Game - Space: Places for successful biographies

The theme of the International Conference from 8 to 12 October 2018 was (Social Play Space – Making Room for Fulfilling Biographies). In lectures by Jan Göschel (Leadership Team), Dan McKanan (Harvard University), Gerald Häfner (Social Science Section), Ha Vinh Tho (Gross National Happiness and Eurasia Foundation) and Joan Sleigh (Executive Council, General Anthroposophical Society), various working groups and an interesting spectrum of panorama presentations of innovative projects, aspects of relationship building and social renewal were taken up as a central concern, challenge and creative contribution of the initiatives in the Council's network. The conference itself was a social-artistic project, not least due to the participation of a group of artists with music, language and eurythmy, and also the attempt to work more inclusively than before. Among the working group leaders and participants were people with different skill profiles and support needs. A solidarity fund made it possible for a relatively large number of people, especially young people, with financial support needs to participate. These initial attempts will be further expanded in the future. A social highlight was a common celebration with live music and dance on the terraces of the Goetheanum.

Annual Meeting of the Delegates of the Council

The delegates of the country networks, working groups and partner organizations of the Council meet annually after the autumn conference for a retreat. The 2018 meeting focused on the focus themes developed in 2016 and 2017. These are:

 Development and implementation of an international (training for trainers) program.
Development and implementation of an international advanced training course in management and leadership

in curative education and social therapy.

Development and publication of texts and other materials for training and practice.
Empirical studies of the quality and results of anthroposophic curative education and social therapy (outcomes studies).
Support for the development and network integration of young professionals.

6. Further development of School of Spiritual Science work. An inventory was made, which gave an overview of the current initiatives and their respective placements in working groups, committees or other parts of the network.

International Training Circle and Training Council

The Training Council, which coordinates the work of the International Training Circle and prepares its annual meeting, is a working group of the Council and meets twice a year in ad-

dition to the annual meeting to support the activities of the training network. Often, the group also connects with training work in different regions. This year, in addition to a working meeting in Dornach, the group was also a guest at the State Pedagogical University in Moscow. In terms of content, the Training Council is concerned, among other things, with the possibilities of implementing an international (Training for Trainers> project (see focus themes above).

22nd International Training Conference Kassel

The topic of the 22nd Annual Meeting of the International Training Circle in Kassel (DE) was (Homelessness as a Phenomenon of Our Time: Professional Uncertainty as a Source of Inner Certainty). This was a continuation of the theme taken up in the previous year. Jan Göschel opened with a lecture

on identity, individuality and embodiment. Andreas Fischer spoke about education and identity development, Bodo von Plato about the longing for homecoming and the feeling of being alive. In 2019, the next step in the development of this theme will lead to methodological-didactical questions.

Research Symposium

Immediately after the training conference, another two-day research symposium took place, this time with contributions by Rebecca Müller (Voices of Inclusion), Christopher Winkelmann (The Concept of the Will in Waldorf Education), Rüdiger Grimm (What Research Questions Does the Curative Education Course Present Today?) and Bernd Kalwitz (Call to Participate in an Empirical Prospective Study).

Social Therapeutic Working Group

In 2018, the Social Therapeutic Working Group dealt with the topic of inclusive education. focusing on how this can be strengthened and implemented in rural areas, especially in the environment of social agriculture. For this a whitepaper is again in the works. Furthermore, the working group is reviewing with its task in light of a generational change of coworkers, of representatives, which naturally also raises fundamental questions with regard to its continued work.

School of Spiritual Science Work

The working group on School of Spiritual Science Work maintains an overview of the status of this work in connection with curative education topics in various countries and prepares initiatives for 2019. These include: an Open School of Spiritual Science Conference in Berlin (DE) in March 2019, a School of Spiritual Science Conference in Järna (SE) during the May conference of the Scandinavian associations; contributions to conferences in Italy, Switzerland, Spain and Hungary; School of Spiritual Science working meetings in Estonia, England, Belgium and New Zealand.

In order to further develop the work on linking the inner path of the curative education course with the contents of the First Class of the School of Spiritual Science, a meeting of class holders active in curative education and social therapy is planned for the end of October 2019.

Library of Anthroposophical Curative Education and Social Therapy

The library for anthroposophical curative education and social therapy, which had been



established over many years at the Council's office in Dornach. was integrated into the library of the School of Spiritual Science at the Goethenaum as a specialist department within the framework of a cooperation agreement. In the future, this will ensure professional support and improved access through inclusion in a large academic catalogue network, as well as regular opening hours and librarian support. The Council will continue to initiate acquisitions and be responsible for the further development of the content of the portfolio.

Office - Reconstruction

The office in Dornach supports the activities of the Council and provides the administrative infrastructure for the work directed by the Leadership Team in terms of content and networking. It also supports the editorial staff of the journal Seelenpflege, published by the Council. In 2018, the office moved from its previous premises on the ground floor of (Haus Laval) to new premises in the same building, one floor up, following a six-month period of homelessness caused by extensive renovations.

Staff in 2018 were: Jan Göschel, Leadership and Managing Director; Bart Vanmechelen, Leadership; Sonja Zausch, Leadership; Gabriele Scholtes, Editor of Journal Seelenpflege; Pascale Hoffmann, Administration and Accounting. On contract basis: Bernhard Schmalenbach, Editor of Journal Seelenpflege; Roland Maus, graphics; Sophie Alex, graphics; as well as volunteer editor of the Council's website: Peter Arni.

Legal Entity

The Anthroposophic Council for Inclusive Social Development represents the field of curative education, social

therapy, social pedagogy and social work with people in need of assistance within the School of Spiritual Science at the Goetheanum, Dornach. Its legal entity is the ‹Fonds für Heilpädagogik und Sozialtherapie Dornach›, an association under Swiss law not registered in the commercial register. For 2018, the Board consisted of Michael Dackweiler, President, Manfred Trautwein and Holger Wilms. Managing director was Jan Göschel.

Annual Financial Report

The Council's funds are made available to it predominantly through solidarity contributions from the countries and their national organizations and institutions. Each country contributes on the basis of its own resources and in relation to other countries' contributions. The Fonds is responsible for drawing up the budget and the annual financial state-



ments. Delegates are provided with the annual statements and the budget for the new financial year. These are also presented and discussed at the annual delegates' meeting. The summary financial statements are published in the Journal Seelenpflege and on the Council's website.


The year 2018 ended with a surplus of just under CHF 51,000 before transfer to reserves. This resulted from a combination of increased country contributions from some countries, structural savings in the office that have now taken effect, the absence of rental costs during the conversion of the office building and a somewhat more favorable exchange rate development. This enabled a provision of CHF 50,000 to be made from the current budget to the Fund for International Projects. This fund is available for projects arising from the Council's work. It was largely created by regular inflows until 2017 from
